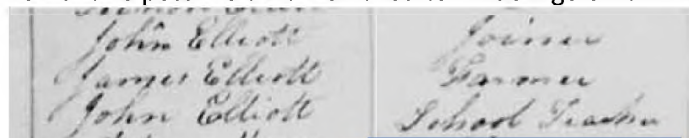

As previously shown in Book 1, John Jr. was born in the Bradworthy area of N. Devonshire. He was the oldest son after the birth of four sisters. When the family was in Marwood, Devon in the 1841 English census, John was not found with the family group. As has been speculated, he had either struck out on his own locally or may have already made the trip across the Atlantic. He would have been 24 years old by the time of the 1841 census. This does lead to the speculation that he likely came over before the family, stayed in the Port Hope area with what were likely Elliott relatives and surveyed the area in search of obtaining farmland for the core family. His Ingersoll Chronicle obituary states he had been living in Scarboro for 10 years before moving to N Oxford. If this is correct and not misinformation warped by time, he would have been in Canada by 1838 as he is first found in Oxford County in 1848. He was probably living with his relative John Elliott and his wife Mary, the mysterious John72 in Book 1 that can be found linked with the family and buried with John Jr's parents in IRC. John Jr. may have travelled to Oxford County Upper Canada to review the land prospects there prior to the main family's arrival. Since most of eastern Upper Canada was settled, the family search centered in Brock District which included Oxford Co. Another hint that he was the first to arrive was that he married Alice Richardson on 22 Nov, 1844 in Scarboro. The marriage information indicates both he and Alice lived there at the time. His last name was listed as "Alliot" on the document. This lends credence that he spent time in Port Hope and met Alice just as his parents and siblings arrived in Canada. John Jr. and John72 (from Book 1) seemed to have a relationship. I suspect that John72 was a relative of John Jr's and that they may have been in close contact in Scarboro in the decade before the rest of John Jr's family arrived. John Jr. was the informant on John72's death certificate yet John72 was listed as living with the William Seldon family at the time. John72 was a teacher and the 1842 census of next-door Middlesex County had a John Elliott (teacher) living with a John Elliott farmer. Might be a long shot but could it be possible that men tried to made a go of it in 1842 in Middlesex?

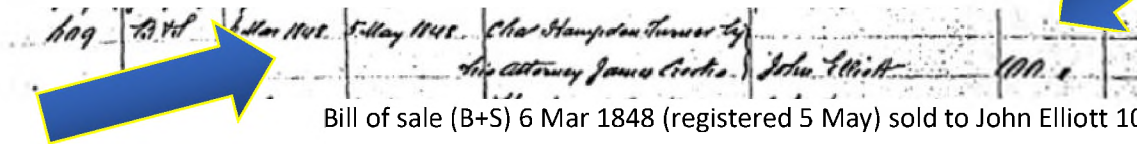
Once John's parents and siblings arrived, he likely helped his father with the build of the first family home at Lot 7 Con 1 W Zorra just north of Rayside. Once the family was settled around 1845, he set about obtaining his own farm for himself and his spouse.

Spouse Alice Richardson was born in Dunbar, Ont. near Dundas in 1825. Her sister was born in Ancaster so that would likely be the best guess. Her father was George Richardson, a farmer in Scarborough. He was born in 1879 in Northumberland, England. Her mother was Ellen Armstrong from the Scottish Highlands. Ellen was 20 years younger than her husband. She was 18 when she birthed oldest child Alice.



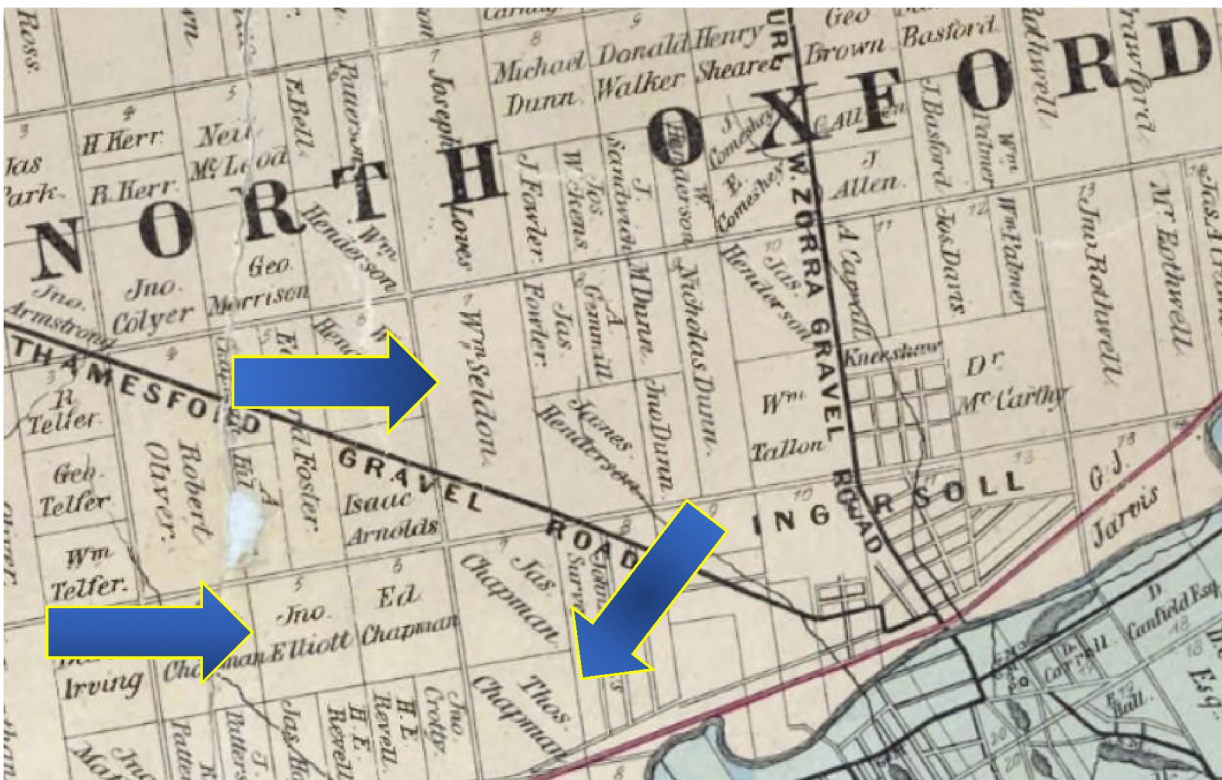
On 6th of March, 1848 and registered 5th of May, John Jr. took possession of 100 acres of Lot 5 Con 4 N Oxford (it appears to read north ½ on the document) from Charles Hampton Turner. By 1861, 60 Of the 100 acres were cleared and 40 acres were grain and roots crops and orchards. This 100-acre parcel of land is diagonally opposite his sister Maria Seldon's farm at Lot 7 Con 3 and they were slightly more than half a kilometer apart. Close by farms also included the Chapman family. Thomas Chapman would marry John's niece Elizabeth Seldon. The farm carried many

mortgages and transactions until October of 1893 when John's estate transferred ownership to youngest son Richard Seldon Elliott a month after John's September 1893 death. The present-day location of the property is now called Hammondview Farms.

John was involved in the running of the township of N Oxford and was a trustee with the Dickson Corner school.

The couple's first child arrived in 1846. In fact, two children were born in 1846 which leads to the question of them being twins. Future generations in all the Elliott family trees had a proliferation of twins. There is no record of where the family was living in 1846. Either John and Alice were living in

Scarboro around 1845 and moved to N Oxford and bought the farm in 1848 or he was living in an as yet unfound Oxford County location during that period. The couple managed to have twelve children between 1846 and 1868. However, the deaths of young children were prevalent in the John Elliott Jr family. In fact, John died five weeks after son Joseph. John's obituary gives great insight into his life.

Archibald McKellar heard on behalf of John Elliott, praying the Council to grant some aid from the general funds of the Township toward his support; said John Elliott having been confined to his bed for nearly six months with a broken leg.
Moved by Mr. Henderson, seconded by Mr. Rudick, and
Resolved,—That the Reeve sign an order in favor of John Elliott or bearer for the sum of \$20. Carried.

OBITUARY.

JOHN ELLIOTT.

The death of Mr. John Elliott, which occurred at his late home, North Oxford, on Sunday last, removes one of the oldest and most highly respected residents of the county.

Deceased was born in Devonshire, England, in 1817, and came to this country 52 years ago, settling in Scarboro. In those days there were no "ocean greyhounds" which cross the ocean in a little more than five days, as at present, but simply sailing vessels, and Mr. Elliott was on the boisterous waters fifteen weeks before his craft reached the harbor.

After a residence of some ten years in Scarboro he purchased a farm in North Oxford, where he has lived continuously ever since. There were, of course, no railroads at that time, and he had to drive the whole of the distance over roads that were considered good in those days, which would hardly be classed as such now, being of the corduroy style, the nature of which, perhaps, most of our readers are familiar with.

North Oxford was then a dense forest. There were a few clearings in the neighborhood, but Mr. Elliott had to hew out for himself a home in the wilderness, so to speak, there not being a clear acre on his whole farm. However, he went bravely to work and gradually the forest disappeared, until finally he had one of the best farms in the county.

During his residence in Scarboro deceased was married to Miss Alice Richardson, who survives him, and had he lived they would have celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary a few weeks hence. They had twelve children, seven of whom are living, as follows: Thomas, of Guelph; Henry and James, of Mackinaw, Mich.; Charles, of Beachville; George E., of North Oxford; Mrs. Andrew Bailey, of Ingersoll, and Richard, who lives on the old homestead. Mr. Elliott was a trustee of S. S. No. 3, North Oxford, for over a quarter of a century, and was a man highly esteemed by all who knew him. Deceased had been ailing for about a year from Bright's disease of the kidneys and was confined to his bed about three weeks before death ensued.

Alice died in 1900. Alice's death was the third within three weeks in the Richardson family as two of her sisters had passed in the previous weeks.

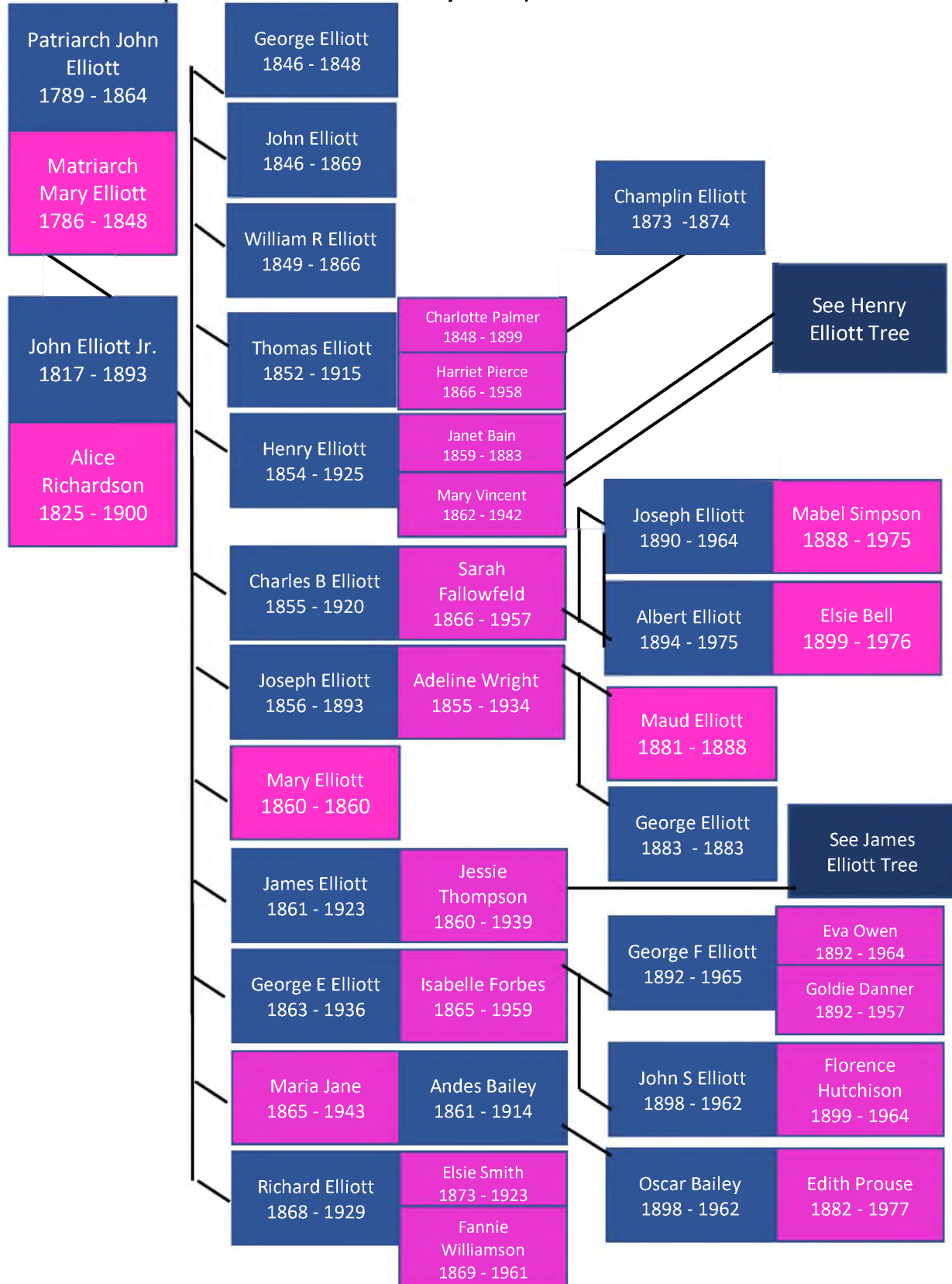

John's death was attributed to Bright's Disease, now known as chronic nephritis or kidney failure. John Jr. and Alice's light red granite memorial is featured on the top of the hill at IRC and is in the Elliott/Seldon/Wilson/Hamlyn/Prouse group. Several of their children are also placed there.

George was the first child born to John and Alice. He was first buried in the Elliott farm cemetery of which no location has been found. He was "removed" to IRC in April of 1867 with a number of relatives once the IRC cemetery had opened. His birth place being listed on the IRC record as N Oxford confirms that the family was not in Scarboro during the 1846 year but living in N Oxford.

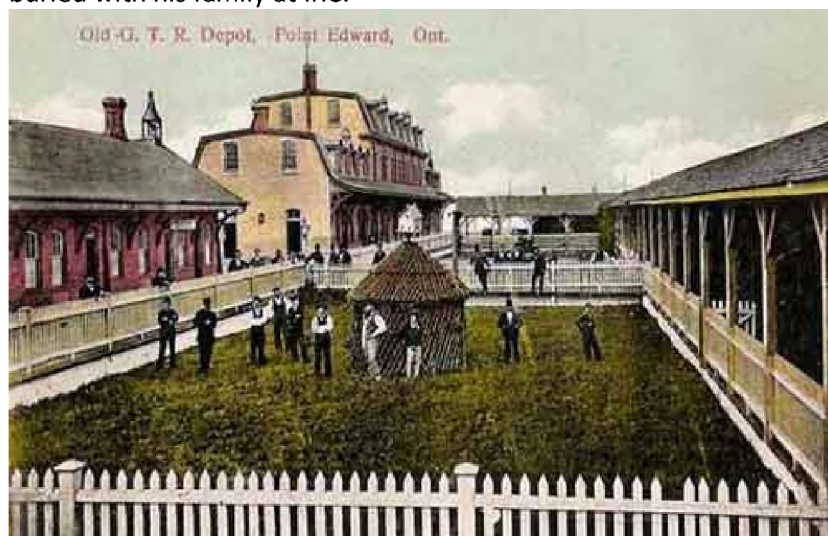

Due to being born in the same year as George, it may be possible they were twins.

IRC records indicate he died at age 23 of Typhoid Fever. At the time of his death, he was living in Point Edward, a small community adjacent to Sarnia. Why he was there is unknown. However, Point Edward was the Canadian Terminus of the Grand Trunk Railroad as of 1859 and as such, most everyone living in the small village was employed by them. I suspect that was the case with John. Unmarried John was buried with his family at IRC.



The Grand Trunk arrived in Point Edward in November 1859. A grand station-hotel was built to mark the Canadian Terminus of the rail line, the grandest Grand Trunk structure west of Toronto. An impressive three-storey white brick building, the station-hotel was 200 feet long and approximately 40 feet tall. Features included first and second-class waiting rooms, dining facilities, apartments for the stationmaster and his family, and overnight accommodations.

The station stood on the waterfront on land that is now partially beneath the Blue Water Bridge and the

west balcony featured a beautiful view of the St. Clair River and Lake Huron. The station was also complimented by its landscaping, including gardens, flower beds, and a fountain. 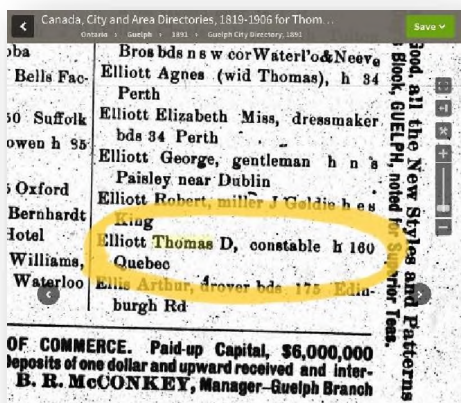

First wife Charlotte was from the William Palmer farming family in N. Oxford.

Within a year the married couple had their first child and were living on his father's farm. They moved to Guelph prior to 1888. As noted, Thomas was a county constable in the 1891 census of Guelph and tax records indicate that was his profession from at least 1888 until 1898. Charlotte died in 1899 after suffering from tuberculosis for two years.

Emma Roth's Child.

On Tuesday there was published a summary of the evidence in an inquest held at Eden Mills on the death of a child, whose mother is Emma Roth. The mother had been keeping house for Joseph Zinger, hotel-keeper, at Eden. Ugly rumors spread around concerning the death of the child. Coroner Herod, instructed by the County Crown Attorney, held an inquest. It was of a most unsatisfactory nature to the Crown and the Jury as to how the child came to its death from the burns by falling on a stove. The matter is to be sifted to the bottom. The body of the child, some 20 months old, which was buried in New Germany, has been exhumed, and was taken to Guelph by Constable Elliott. A postmortem was held Thursday afternoon at the General Hospital. Dr. John Green, Toronto, assisted Dr. Howitt on the postmortem.

The Roth Case.

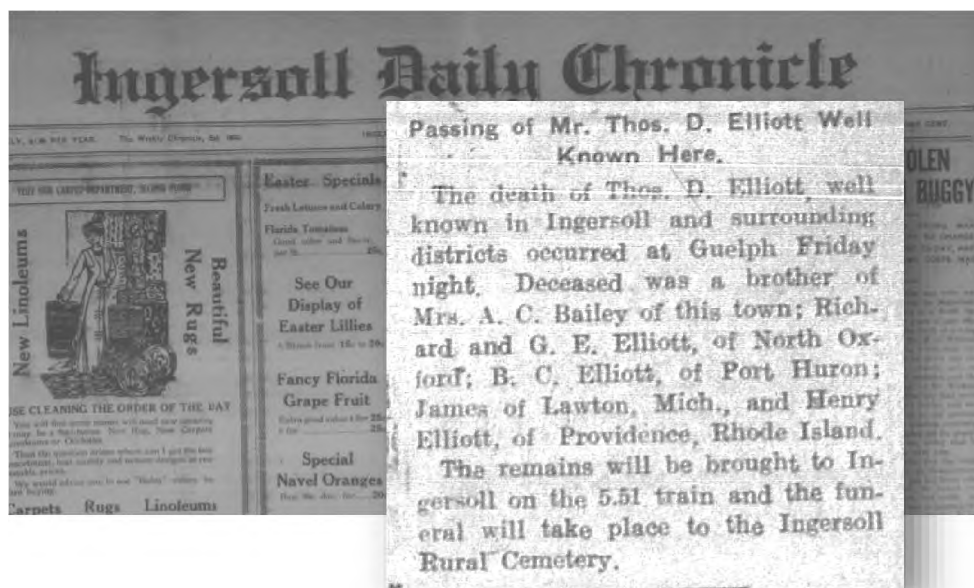
Constable Elliott arrested Joseph Zinger, proprietor of the Eden Mills hotel, Saturday evening. The charge was that of causing the death of the Roth infant. It will be remembered that when Emma Roth's child received the burns Zinger was the only adult in the house. The conclusion of the jury that some one placed the child on the stove directed suspicion against Zinger. Hence the arrest. This afternoon (Monday) the preliminary examination is in progress before Police Magistrate Saunders. Mr. Peterson is appearing for the prosecution and Mr. Mowat is defending the prisoner. The witnesses are Emma Roth, Dr. Herod, Dr. Dryden, Walter Laing, Mrs. Plummer, Mrs. Shannon and James Anderson. The prisoner was committed for trial and will be brought before the grand jury at the present Guelph assizes.—Guelph Herald.

By 1903, Thomas was remarried to Harriet Brown (nee Pierce). She had emigrated from England in 1885 with her parents and moved to Orangeville Ont. She had her 14-year-old son Albert Edward Brown from her previous marriage living with her. She was 17 years Thomas' junior. They were residing at 24 Melville St. and Thomas was by then a road builder/contractor.

FINED FOR CRUELTY

Albert Gill, of Fergus, who was charged by the Humane Society with ill-treating a horse, was arrested in Galt by Constable Elliott. He was tried in Fergus Thursday and was fined.

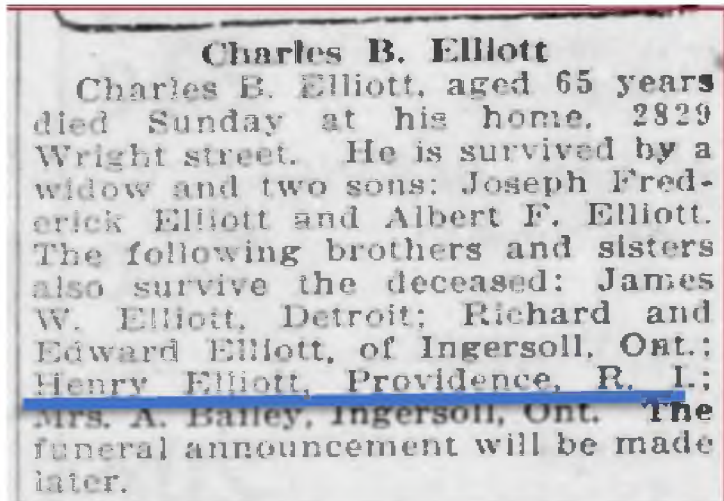

Janet's name was on the deed paperwork. She again gave birth to a daughter, Lulu "Jennie", a month after the purchase. Tragically, Janet died five months later. The cause of death was a weakened heart, possibly caused by the birthing of her last child. She is buried in St. Andrews Presbyterian Cemetery in Thamesford.



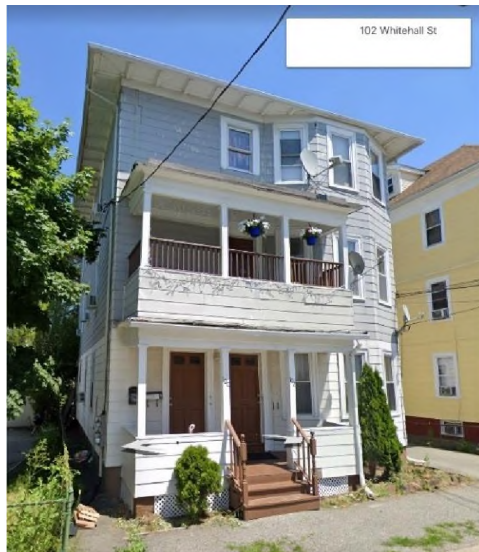
ELLIOTT—In Dereham, on the 10th ult., Janet, wife of Mr. Henry Elliott, aged 25 years.



are that he moved away. Further investigation found Henry listed in a brother's obituary in the Port Huron newspaper.

Henry's brother Charles' death in 1920 lead to an investigation of Henry's history in Providence, Rhode Island.

Backtracking the census info of 1910, he married his second wife Mary Elizabeth Vincent around 1884 in Canada. She gave birth to a daughter Adella "Jessie" in 1885 and to son Gordon in 1887 while living in



Dereham. Previously, Mary was found living with her Putnam based family of N Dorchester township in the 1881 census and her birth location is not known.

Henry, Mary and his son John and daughter Lulu (Janet Bain's children) and Henry and Mary Vincent's two children, emigrated to the USA in 1890. According to son Gordon's declaration of intent to become an American citizen, they crossed at Port Huron and appeared to have settled in Carsonville, Mi.

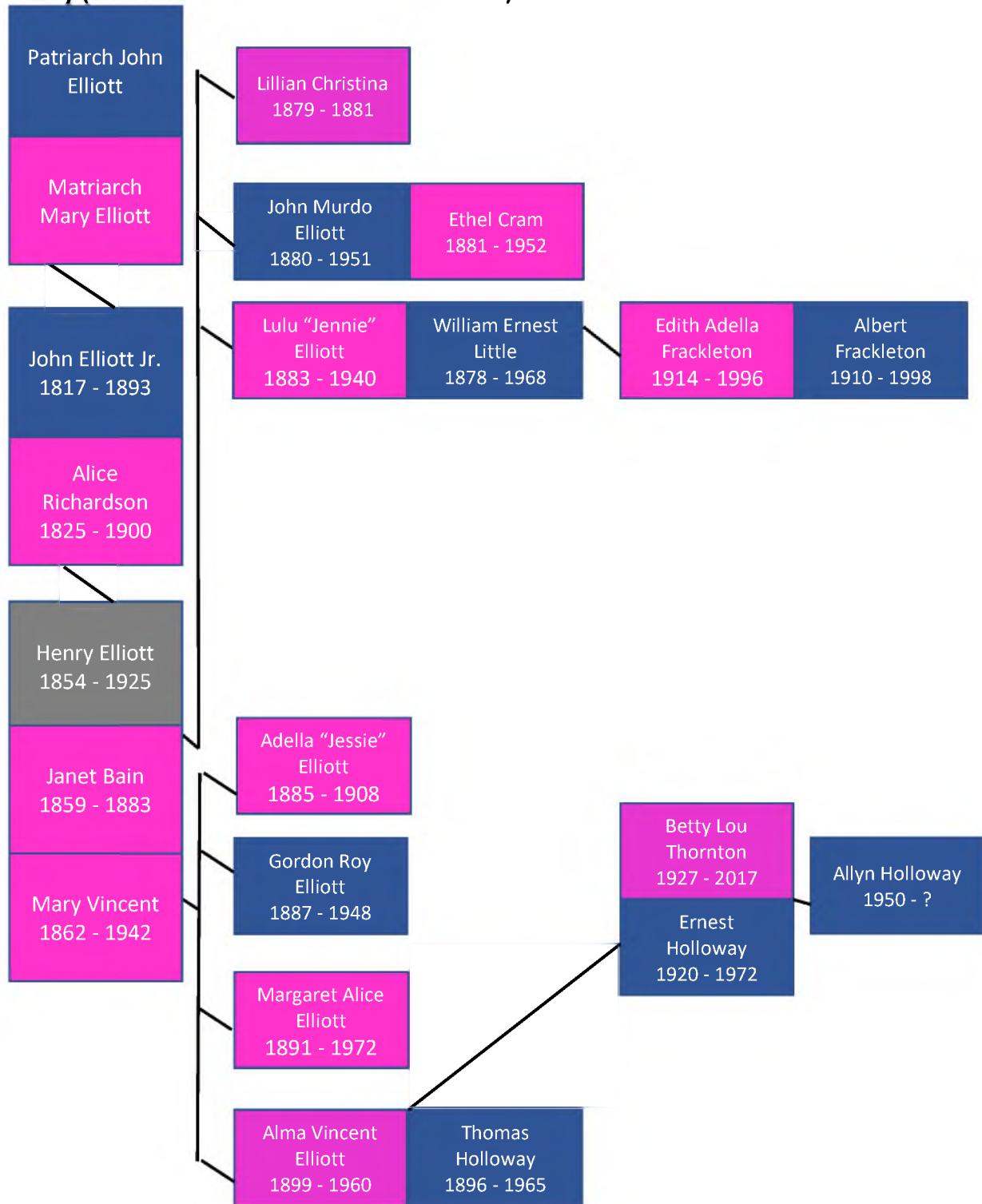

While in Carsonville, daughter Margaret was born in July of 1891. At that point the family moved to Providence, Rhode Island sometime between 1892 and 1899. Their last child, Alma was born in Providence in 1899. The family lived at 102 Whitehall St. for a number of years. Henry had many occupational labour jobs in the textile industry. Henry died in Warwick, RI in 1925 and Mary in 1942, also in Warwick, Rhode Island.

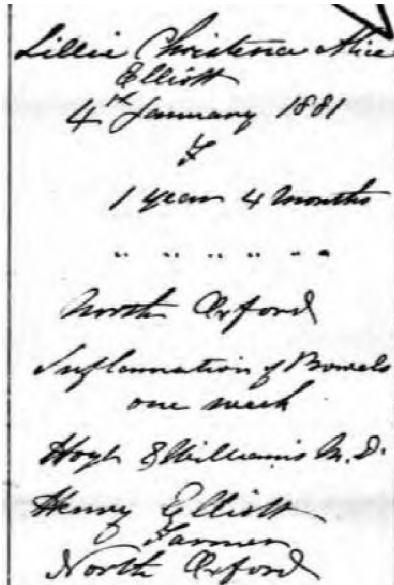

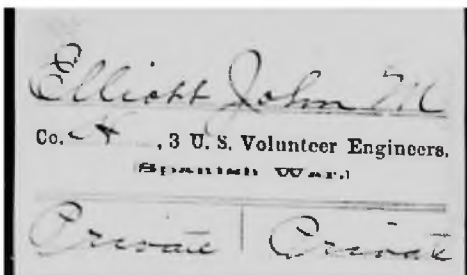

There is an enticing trail for John Murdo. A record trail as suggested by Ancestry indicates that there was a John Murdo Elliott living in Grants Pass, Ore. US records indicated the birth date is a match with Oxford county records and his father's name was Henry Elliott. The biggest caveat is that there are repeated records indicating he was born in Carsonville, Michigan. No John Murdo Elliott can be located as having been born in Carsonville.

However, he did live there. When the family emigrated to the US in 1890, he would have been 10 years old. I suspect his earliest recollections of his youth may have been while in Carsonville. He may have assumed that he was born there. For whatever reason, he was not found living with the family in the

1900 census in Providence. He would have been 20 years old at the time and likely had set out on his own.

It appears he married an Ethel Lee Crum in Salt Lake City in 1910, moved to Twin City, Idaho where he was a farmer/trucker according to the city directory. In 1926 the couple moved to the Grants Pass,

Oregon area taking his mother-in-law with him. He was a farmer in both Idaho and Oregon. No children could be located for the couple and they retired to 1306 Fruitdale Dr. in Grants Pass. Previous to that they lived at RR3 Grants Pass. It

was noted at that time (1942) they did not have a telephone. They died within a year of each other. John Murdo Elliott's death certificate has a hidden factual gem. It seems he was a veteran of the Spanish American War of 1898 and was a private at age 18. The war lasted only 5 months. The American government intervened in The Cuban War of Independence after the USS Maine was blown up in Havana harbour. John's cousin Sarah Elliott (daughter of uncle James Elliott) married another Spanish American war veteran, Stephen Dundass.

He entered the employ of the railroad Sept. 23, 1912, at the former Block I Shops which were destroyed by fire in November of that year.

He was transferred to the temporary shop and later to the new shops built in 1917.

He served in the Army during World War I.

He and Miss Elsie Hall, Toronto, were married in 1921.

They have a daughter, Mrs. Douglas J. McLeod, Port Huron.

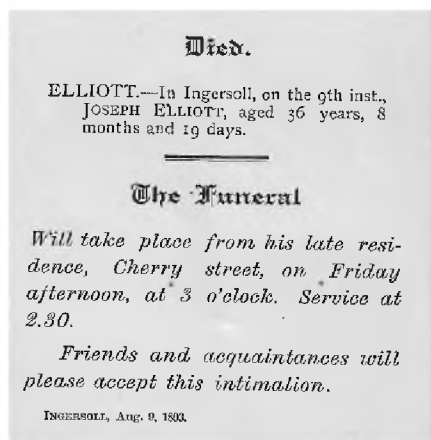

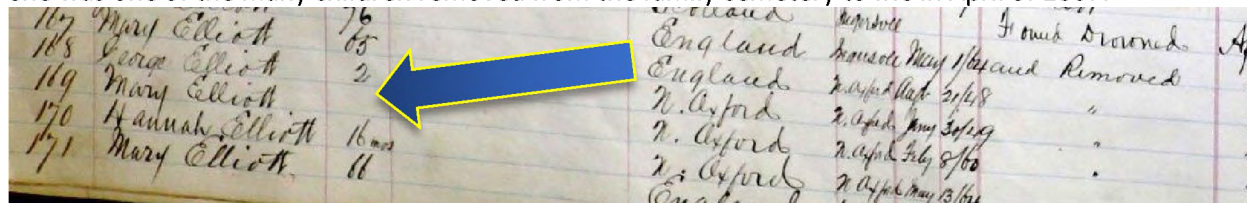

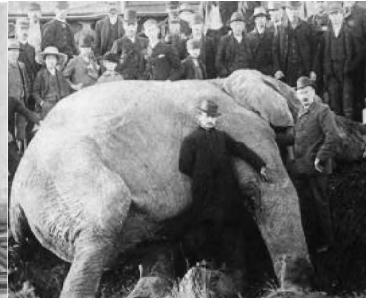

From there, they moved to the major rail hub of St Thomas, where James started working as a fireman on a steam engine for one of the three rail companies that

passed through the town. The birth and death location of son Franklin in 1888 confirms this. The family had another child, Jennie, born in 1889. James would have been in

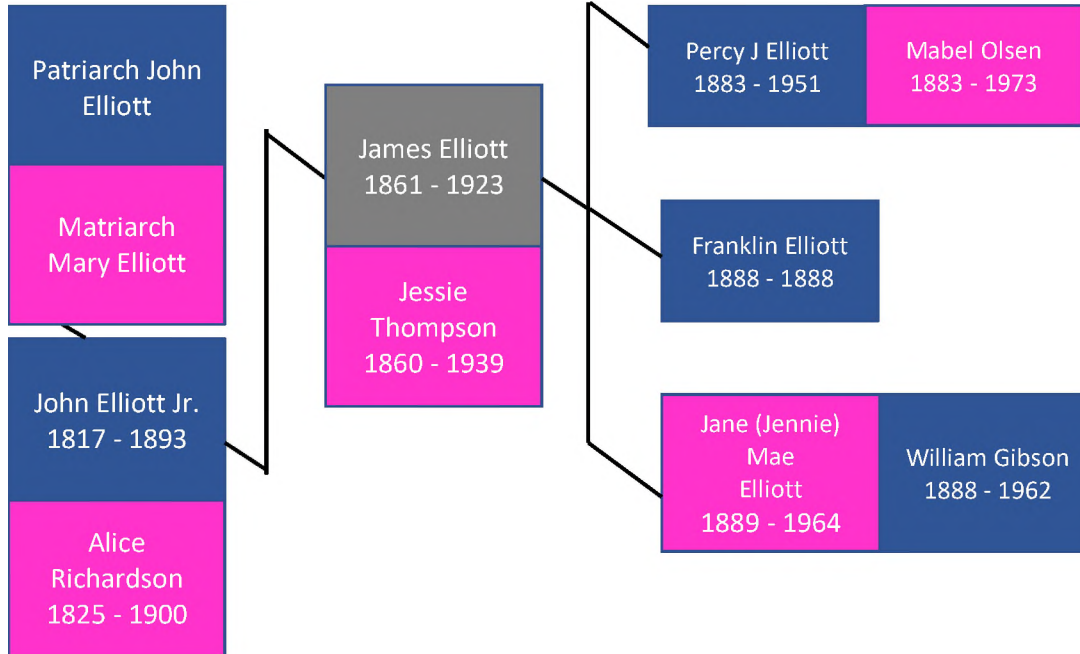
St Thomas when Jumbo the elephant was killed by a locomotive in 1885. According to later US censuses, the family crossed into the United States in 1893. His father's 1893 obit has James living in Mackinaw Mi. with brother Henry. It appears he went to work for the Michigan Central Railroad in Kalamazoo Mi soon after. I suspect his railroad job meant being assigned

to multiple locations. MCRR ran service in Michigan, Indiana and Ontario at that time. They had a rail line that stopped in St. Thomas. Likely that is where James and the railroad first crossed paths. The family lived in Kalamazoo with James working as a clerk for the Pace Marquette RR (which had bought the MCRR), until his untimely death in 1923 of a heart attack at age 62. He is buried in IRC. Wife Jessie remarried auto plant worker David Harris on the 23rd of August 1924. She was 60 years old at the time and he was 10 years her senior. They lived in Kalamazoo. When her second husband died, she moved to Dearborn Mi. and lived with her daughter until her 1939 death. She is buried with James at IRC in Elliott section H.

Percy made it through three years of high school before, at 16 years of age, apprenticing in an insurance office. When older, like his father, Percy worked for the railroad and was stationed in many towns during his career. NYC Foreman Of Engineers Retires Today

**Percy J. Elliot Began
Career Here in 1903.**

The oldest New York Central railroad foreman of engineers in the Michigan division retired today after 45 years and nine months of continual service.

His engines once pulled President Franklin D. Roosevelt's special train in Michigan and two weeks ago they hauled Gov. Thomas E. Dewey's train into Owosso for the special home-coming event there.

He is the third oldest engineer in the Michigan division.

The veteran foreman of the NYC system is Percy J. Elliott, 65, Jackson, a former resident of Kalamazoo. He has held his present position since 1934, but started in the freight yards here in 1903.

Son of Railroader

As a foreman of engineers, Elliott is a sort of "traveling engineer." He works with the regular locomotive engineer and dally runs from Detroit to Chicago through this city. His job is to supervise the duties of engineers and observe conditions during the runs.

Well known in Kalamazoo, Elliott first came to this city in 1889 with his parents, when the father was assigned to the freight yards of this city. After working a year in the freight yards, he signed on as a freeman in 1904 and became an engineer Oct. 15, 1909. He served in this capacity until he was promoted to his present job.

Elliott has seen great advances in locomotives during the years. One of the greatest thrills was operating in one of the first diesel locomotives operated over the Michigan division of New York Central more than a year ago. He described the difference in steam and motor-driven engines as greatest in point of speed, comfort, and train handling.

Plans Trip to California

Born in Cornwall, Ont., Aug. 23, 1883, Elliott's entire family came to Michigan in 1884 and first resided in Mackinaw City and Calumet.

A regular railroad pension will begin for the former Kalamazoo man tomorrow and his future will center mostly about automobiles and outdoor sports, rather than in trains. Elliott recently purchased a new car, expects to go to California for the winter, and also wants to enjoy lots of fishing there. Next spring, both he and his wife will return to their home at 2901 Page avenue, Jackson.

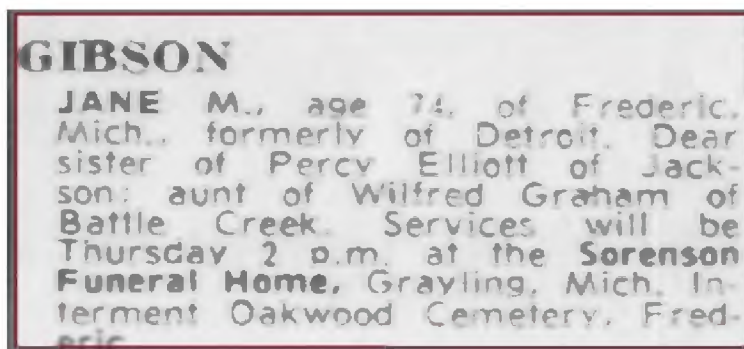

Jennie was born in St Thomas, Ontario and was only four years old when the family arrived in Kalamazoo. In 1912, at age 22, she married William C Gibson of Battle Creek, a town about 15 kms to the east of Kalamazoo. William the son of Thomas and Ann Gibson of Beaverton Mi. Jennie and William lived in Battle Creek prior to WWI. When the US became involved in the war, he went

into service from January to November 1918 and reached the rank of Corporal with the 8th Division Calvary. He and Jennie moved after the war to Dearborn where he worked as an electrician. By 1930, he was a supervising electrical contractor. He continued this job until there was a life turn noted in the 1950 census. By then, the couple were living in the village of Kalkaska Mi. and owned and operated a butcher store. Both worked as meat cutters. Kalkaska is a small village in the north west of Michigan near Travis City and northern Lake Michigan. They were both in their 60s. Their business was on the main street and they lived above the store. How this situation came about is unknown.

It appears that the James Gilroy Elliott family line had reached its conclusion as no children were found in any census for Percy and Jennie.

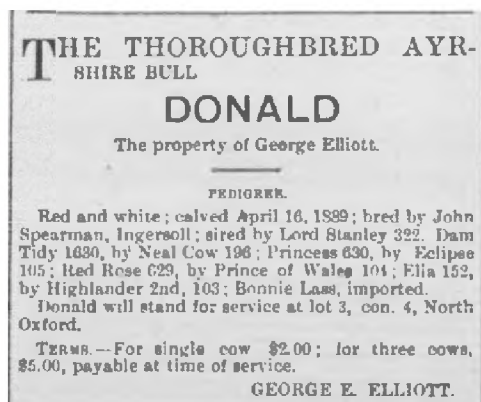

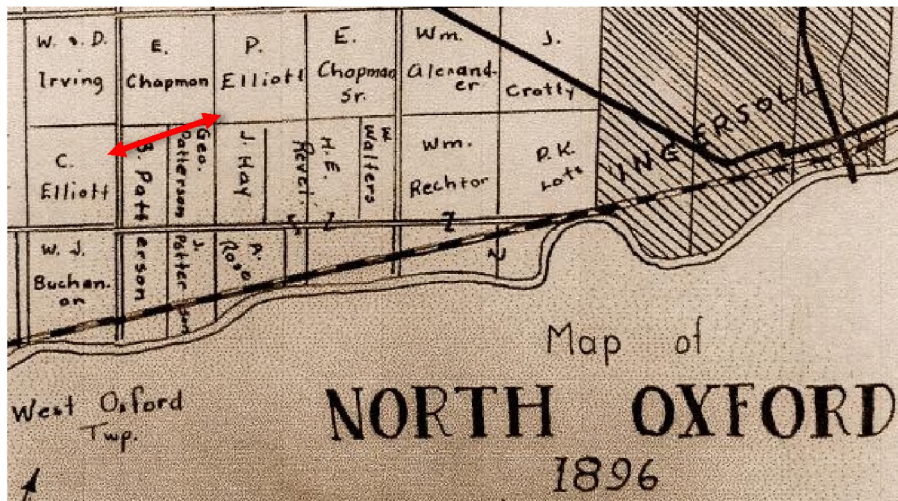

Once again, another boy, George Edward, was born. He was raised on the farm and intended on being a farmer as well. He married Isabella Forbes, daughter of N Oxford farmer John Forbes. She was born outside Littlewood, Middlesex. George and Bella would eventually retire there. The 1891 census had George and Bella living in N Oxford beside his sister Maria and her husband Andrew Bailey. George purchased 100 acres of the S ½ of Lot 3

Con 4 N Oxford in January of 1899 for \$4550 with cousin Thomas Seldon carrying the mortgage. This farm was half a kilometer to the west of his father's original homestead. George raised Ayrshire cattle. He and wife Bella sold in March of 1924 for \$10,000. George was a trustee at the Banner Methodist Church and township council. At the sale, the family moved to London and then to Littlewood, Middlesex, Ontario in 1931.

Following a prolonged period of ill health, the death occurred on Wednesday morning, September 9th, of George Edward Elliott, at the family residence, RR1 Lambeth. The late Mr. Elliott, who was 73 years of age, was born in North Oxford [township], where for a number of years he farmed successfully and had made for himself a host of friends. He had served on the township council. He resided in London also for a time previous to moving to Lambeth. He was a member of the United Church. Left to mourn the passing of a beloved husband and father are his widow and two sons, George Forbes and Stanley at home. Also surviving is one sister, Mrs. Maria Bailey, Ingersoll, to all of whom sincere sympathy is extended.

At some point in wife Isabella's later life, she lost her eyesight. Family assumption was it was due to glaucoma but further research speculates she lost her sight when a kitchen stove exploded.



Banner Cemetery – George's inscription seems to read 1883 not 1863. Bella's is correct at 1865. Buried with George and Isabella is their great grandson, Gary. No reason is known as to how this arrangement came about.

From the Owen Forbes Elliot Family History: (edited)

"George grew up in North Oxford and went to the school at Dickson's Corners. He worked as an accountant and then as a gas inspector in the London area. First wife Eva Owen first met George at the skating rink in Ingersoll in 1911 when they were both in their late teens.

Eva was born Eva Catherine Hanna Owen on 11 April 1892 in Lobo Ontario. Her parents were David Reece Owen (1854 USA - 1935 Delaware ON) and Mary Jane (Jennie) Zavitz (1861 ON - 1929 Lobo ON). She had 6 brothers and 1 sister. Her father owned stores in both Lobo and Fernhill, where he (and his brothers), were postmasters from 1864 to 1912. David Reece Owen's roots were in Pembrokeshire and Carmarthenshire, Wales. Jennie Zavitz came from a pioneer family from Norfolk County. The families

arrived in Canada via New York and Pennsylvania respectively. In the early 1910s, he was a gas inspector.

George enlisted in the Canadian Expeditionary Force on 4 January 1915. His unit, the 7th Canadian Mounted Rifles sailed for England in July 1915 aboard the S.S. Northland. They were stationed at the large CEF training base at Shorncliffe in Kent, where he achieved the rank of corporal. In 1916 he transferred to the Royal Flying Corps at Reading, Berkshire with the rank of junior lieutenant. In late 1916 he was posted to Ismailia, Egypt for actual flight training, where he may have been involved in a crash landing. The squadron at Ismailia also provided air reconnaissance and support against the Turkish forces in the area. He returned to England in March 1917 and was assigned to the Central Flying School at Up Avon, Wiltshire. The following August he joined RFC #60 squadron on active duty in Flanders. After 35 operational flights he was invalided back to England and then to Canada in early 1918. Medical records reflect that he had superficial wounds and that he suffered a nervous disorder, that today would be recognized as Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. This was not uncommon in WW I fighter pilots whose life expectancy on active duty numbered less than 30 days.

Although George had proposed to marry Eva in 1915 before he left for England, she told him it would not happen until the war was over, although they did get engaged. She was true to her word and after George was discharged in 1918, they were married on September 26th in Delaware, Ontario. Following the marriage they moved to Toronto, as George had a job in the Rehabilitation Office (source is a note written by Eva), They first lived in an apartment on Jarvis Street and then moved to 90 Walmsley Boulevard in the

Yonge & St Clair area. Eva had a brother named Max who was married to Agnes Lang, her brother, Clifford Lang owned the house on Walmsley Boulevard. In a strange twist of fate, the couple's son Owen Forbes Elliott lived at that same house when he attended the University of Toronto in 1946. By 1922 George and Eva had moved back to Ingersoll where it appears, George continued to have difficulty adjusting to civilian life. He tried to start his own business in 1922 & 1923, with money borrowed from his father, but it failed. In 1924 they moved to a house on Southgate Street in London, this time paid for by Eva's father David Owen.

Their first child Norma Isabella was born August 29th 1924 in Delaware. In 1926, a second child, Owen Forbes was born on April 26th, also in Delaware. Sadly, Norma died of tuberculous meningitis the following year.

Frustrated by George's inability to settle down, Eva left him in 1926 and went to live in Delaware with his parents, a move supported by both families. She later moved into her own house in Delaware and raised her son Owen with the help of George's parents. George's whereabouts from 1926 until the marriage to Golda Danner in 1929 are not known. From later records, it is clear that he had connections to the Detroit area. In addition, his uncles, James Gilroy Elliott and Charles Brooks Elliott, had both moved to Michigan, but both had died prior to 1926.

Nonetheless George left Canada and was never heard from again until records surfaced that he had moved to Indiana and remarried a woman named Golda (or Goldie) Danner in 1929. George spun a few lies on the marriage license, indicating it was his first marriage, that he was born in Indiana and that his Mother 'Isabelle Forbes' had died – all not true. At the time of the illegitimate marriage, he was living on Main Street in Richmond, Indianapolis, working as a salesman.

There are several records tracking George's whereabouts in the 1930's and 1940's, most of them confirm his marriage to Golda Danner. A 1930 census record puts them at Central Avenue in Indianapolis while a 1936 city directory has them at 2911 Illinois Avenue. The 1940 census has them back at Central.

Besides selling farming machinery he also sold automobiles and worked for the catalogue company Montgomery Ward. The couple primarily lived in Indianapolis in the 1930s and 1940's before moving to Lincoln Park Mi. during WWII.

On April 24, 1942 George registered for the draft due to WW II. It was mandatory for all men born before 1897 to do so. He listed his residence as 240 Grove, Highland Park, Wayne, (presumably Wayne County), in Michigan. He was working for Montgomery Ward at 400 South Washington in Royal Oak (Detroit suburb).

In 1945 George crossed into the USA from Canada at the Ambassador Bridge in Detroit listing his birthplace in Ingersoll on July 22, 1892. He claimed permanent residency in the US with wife Golda Rena Danner Elliott; living at 615 West Troy, Ferndale, Michigan. He also claimed he had no living relatives in Canada. It is inconceivable that he had spent time in Canada and did not try to contact his brother, his mother, his legal wife or his then teenage son, all very much alive at the time.

There are no further records until a U.S. Social Security Death Index of a 'George Eliot' who died in November 1965 at age 73. The death occurred in Michigan but is recorded in the Indiana SSN database. Indiana is where George's SSN #303-09-3761 was issued sometime in the late 1930's or 1940's. The birthdate in the SSN Death Index database is July 22, 1893. A further connection is the burial of George Elliot in Section 94, Lot 439 in Crown Hill Cemetery, Indianapolis, on November 5, 1965. This is the same cemetery and plot location where Golda Danner and her sister Bessie (Marine) Danner are

buried. Golda Danner was buried there on August 30, 1957. Her earlier death begs the question as to who arranged for George's remains to be transported and interred in Indianapolis? The mystery of his disappearance from Canada is solved but his connections in Detroit remain a mystery."

When WWI broke out, George's attestation papers show he joined the Canadian forces at the age of 21 after serving one year with the Army Corp in Canada.

His military record indicates that:

He was stationed in Egypt.

He was with the 7th Canadian Military Regiment attached to the Canadian Royal Flying Corp and reached the rank of Lieutenant in April 1917.

He was hospitalized twice: 3 Feb, 1917 and returned to service in April and hospitalized again on 27, Oct, 1917.

He was invalided to England 04, Nov, 1917, discharged in May 1918 and returned to Canada.

One of his injury was listed as scarring on his upper right arm as noted in border paperwork.

Pilot Lieutenant George Forbes Elliott



The Royal Flying Corps (RFC) is a formation not normally associated with campaigns outside of the Western Front, however this image shows men from the RFC in a very famous setting in early 1916. One of the main squadrons operating in Egypt at this time was 14 Squadron, and these men will be from them. They were based at a number of locations around the Suez Canal from 1915, keeping an eye on the Turks in Palestine and tribes in the Western Desert; towards the end of 1916 this involved in assisting T.E. Lawrence: 'Lawrence of Arabia'.

The RFC men in the photo are wearing the familiar 'Maternity Jacket' uniform which must have been fairly warm in desert conditions and possibly means they had not been 'in theatre' that long. I once interviewed a WW1 veteran who said that this location was the most popular place to have your photo taken in Egypt, with the backdrop of the Sphinx and Pyramids. The cost of the photo was relatively cheap and soldiers would be queuing up to have them done; a little board was placed in front of the camels with a number on (visible in this photo) and you then came back, quoted the number, and got your postcards to send home. I have since interviewed men who served in WW2 and post-war and it seems little changed over 50-odd years!

George's mother Isabelle (Bella) lived with first wife Eva in Delaware, Ontario and died there in 1959.



Isabelle had lost her sight in the 1930's. Eva lived in Delaware until she died in 1964.

Her brother Fred Owen lived nearby and acted as a mentor for her son Owen. Eva's tombstone still indicated that she was the wife of George.

According to 1945 border papers, George lived in the US from 1909 – 1911 and again travelled and/or lived in the US from 1919 – 1945. Family historian, John Schaw, of George's son Owen Elliott's family points out that "This was a lie on George's part (among many), he did not live in the US between 1909-1911 nor from 1919 to about 1926 when he left his family – the reason he made this statement was to try to validate his residency and immigration claim."

The locations of where he was may be true if he was a travelling farm machinery salesman.

The second son of George Elliott and Isabella Forbes was educated at Dickson's Corners school. He attended Ingersoll Collegiate where he was on the baseball team. He and his future wife were involved in the local Literary Society. He left to fight in WWI as did his brother. He received his attestation papers in February of 1916. Stanley was only 17

years old at the time. He served as a private with the 168th

Canadian Expeditionary Force from Feb. 1916 to June 1919. When he returned, he was the enumerator for the 1921 census of N Oxford.

“Stanley Elliott is a driver with the Canadian Forestry Corps of Mechanical Transport, in England.”

Quote from Ingersoll Collegiate Excelsior Yearbook 1918

“His unit sailed from Halifax on October 30, 1916 and arrived at the Shorncliffe training base in Kent on November 29th, assigned to the Moore barracks. While his brother George had been at Shorncliffe earlier that year, he was already enrolled in flight aviation training at Reading. The service records indicate that John Stanley was hospitalized due to acute tonsillitis in 1917. Fortunately for him he was then assigned to the Forestry Corps, and although he served in France it was not evident that he



engaged in direct combat. The Forestry Corps were responsible for supplying all the wood products required by the army, and naturally this job fell to the Canadians. He was discharged in June 1919. When he returned to Ingersoll, he ran an electrical business and married Florence Hutchinson in 1921. They had 2 sons, William (Billy) and Douglas. It is clear from photo albums that Billy and Owen were close friends. Billy married Shirley Thornton (about 1950) and lived in the Grimsby/St Catharines area; they had four children. He died of leukemia in 2007. Douglas lived near Woodstock but there is some confusion around his marriages, so more investigation is required there. He died in 2013 and is buried in Banner cemetery. Gary, inscribed on the stone of George and Isabella was Douglas' son.”

After the war he lived close to or on the family farm now run by his uncle Richard Elliott according to the 1921 census. He purchased Lot 5 of Con 3 – 100 acres east half (Onland.ca) for \$10,000 in 1921. He married Florence Hutchison, daughter of William Hutchison and Birdie Day of N Oxford the same year. He went back to farming for a few years, in the 1920s before the selling the farm and moving to London in 1929. The 1931 census showed the family lived at 604 Emery St which was at the corner of Emery and High St. The building was a corner store and the family lived on the second floor and Stanley was the ground floor grocery store owner. They returned to Ingersoll in 1946 and established an electrical supply business at the SE corner of Thames and King St. They lived at 389 Wellington St. in Ingersoll.

How Stanley acquired the knowledge to work in the electrical field is unknown but his shop was prosperous and he was a major contributor of the installation and conversion of DC to AC current in the early 1950s in Ingersoll.

The bride was supported by Miss Alice Richardson, of Toronto, cousin of the groom while he was assisted by Mr. John Harris, of Aylmer, cousin of the bride. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Dr. Williamson of Ingersoll. After partaking of an excellent repast the guests enjoyed themselves until a late hour when the happy couple left amid a shower of rice for Ingersoll, where they took the train for Toronto. The guests were from Saginaw, Toronto, London, Ingersoll and Norwich. The wedding presents were numerous and costly.—Norwich Gazette.

Richard was born at the N Oxford farm of his father. He married Elsie Smith, daughter of William Andes Smith and Matilda Moyer of Dereham. Richard and Elsie lived on his father's farm and was a farm labourer.

When his father John Jr. died in 1893, he willed the farm to Richard. Richard immediately took an interest in local affairs and was on the township council for a number of years in the early 1910s. He eventually became township reeve from 1916 to 1917.

He was also highly involved in the Canadian Order of Foresters. Elsie also was involved in many clubs and organizations at that time. Elsie's health started to decline in 1922 and it was found she had cancer of the uterus. She died a painful death in 1923.

After Elsie's death, Richard married Fanny Oliver in 1926. She was the daughter of English immigrant Thomas Williamson who arrived in Ingersoll in 1869 and died in Ingersoll in 1921. She first married Edward William Oliver and had three sons. Fanny was raised on a farm "one concession over" at Lot 5 Con 4 from Richard's family near Dickson's Corners. Her children were long established when she married Richard when both were in their late 50s. Fanny was prominent in the IODE organization in Ingersoll. Richard continued to show interest in township affairs as he later was the financial manager and club secretary of the North Oxfords Farmers Club from 1925-1929.

Richard died in 1929 of pneumonia. His will gave the farm to Fanny. She leased out the land until her name disappears from Onland.ca ownership records in 1951 when she granted the land to George R Hunt for \$10,000. She moved into Ingersoll and lived out her life at 110 Charles St. W. She is buried in IRC with her first husband. Richard had no children.

Mrs. F. Elliott Dies In 93rd Year

A well known and highly esteemed resident of North Oxford and Ingersoll, in the person of Mrs. Fanny Oliver-Elliott, of 110 Charles Street West, passed away in Alexandra Hospital on Sunday, May 7th. She had been in ill health for several months and seriously ill for the past month.

Born in Cartmole, England, she was in her 93rd year and was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. Williamson, and came to Ingersoll with her family 66 years ago. Following her marriage to the late Edward Oliver, she resided in North Oxford for a number of years. Mr. Oliver predeceased her in 1911 and in 1925 she married the late Richard Elliott of North Oxford whose death occurred in 1929. In 1948 Mrs. Oliver-Elliott moved to Ingersoll where she had since resided.

A charter member of the Admiral McDougall Chapter I.O.D.E., also a member of the Dickson's Corners Ladies Aid, Mrs. Oliver-Elliott took an active part in both organizations. She had always taken a keen interest in community affairs, and her kindly and friendly nature had endeared her to a large circle of friends.
