Fashionable Wedding.

An unusual excitement took place in town on last Tuesday morning, the cause being the marriage of A. N. Christopher, Esq., of this place, to the eldest daughter of our respected fellow-townsman, Charles E. Chadwick, Esq. The ceremony took place in the new Church of St. James, at half-past eleven, long before which hour, the Church was filled by the youth and beauty of the town, particularly the fairer portion. As Ingersoll can boast of handsomer women and braver men than can be found in any other town, the scene at the Church was, as may be imagined, attractive in the highest degree. As the bride entered the Church precisely at the hour named, leaning on the arm of her father, and accompanied by the four handsome and gaily-dressed bridesmaids, the bridegroom and groomsmen having previously arrived, the organ pealed forth, by which time the "flutter" had reached its height. The bride and bridegroom, bridesmaids and groomsmen, then took their places. and the ceremony was proceeded with, the incumbent, the Rev. Mr Hincks, officiating. This being the first wedding that has taken place in the Church, and the parties being wellknown and highly respected, the event was one of more than ordinary interest. At the close of the ceremony, the clergyman presented the bride elect with a beautiful copy of the " Prayer Book," The party then proceeded to the residence of the bride's father, and in a few hours after took the train for New Tork and other points east. We heartily wish long life, happiness and prosperity to the young couple, whose married life has commenced under auspices so favorable.




Mary Margaret Chadwick & her new husband, Aaron Napoleon Christopher purchased a lot on the west side of Oxford Street, south of Ann Street from her father Charles in 1870, just a month after their wedding. A grand house was to be constructed by Aaron & his brothers: Christopher Brothers, building contractors, Ingersoll for his new bride. Known as 'Rowanwood', 276 Oxford Street, was to represent one of the best addresses in town. Built in the Italianate style, which was introduced in England at the beginning of Queen Victoria's reign as a model suburban housing for the rising mercantile class, Rowanwood features a central Tuscan Tower with tall rounded Italianate windows and deep, bracketed eaves.

Rowanwood featured a white marble fireplace in the living room, the oversized mirror, with its intricately carved wooden frame and the low marble topped table in the front entranceway. The tall archway to the hall is flanked with two red stained glass panels resembling side lights. As was the custom, a lady would designate one day of the month as her "Calling Day" at which time she would be at home to receive guests. Fashionable women would leave their calling card as evidence of their visit. One former Ingersoll resident recalls, as a child, donning her white gloves and with her mother paying a visit to the Christopher home. This house with its large double living room was the scene of many memorable parties.



Mary Chadwick & Aaron Christopher had two daughters, Jean Helen (1875-1942) & Frances Neilson (1877-1964).

Jean & Frances never married and lived together at Rowanwood, 276 Oxford Street, all of their lives, until their respective deaths.

MISS FRANCES CHRISTOPHER DIES IN 92nd YEAR

Following a long period of ill health, a well known and highly esteemed resident of Ingersoll, in the person of Miss Frances Christopher, 276 Oxford Street, passed away on 10 May 1964. Miss Christopher who was in her 92nd year was born in Ingersoll to Mr. & Mrs. A. N. Christopher and had been a life long resident of Ingersoll and her quiet and kindly nature had won for her a host of friends. She was a member of St. James Anglican Church. Left to mourn her passing are two cousins, Miss Nora Chadwick & Mrs. Crete Marlin, both of Ingersoll. Miss Christopher rested at the Walker & Clifton Funeral Home, where services were held on Wednesday afternoon, 13 May, with Rev. R. R. Sadleir, rector of St. James Anglican Church, officiating. Interment was made at the Ingersoll Rural Cemetery, casket bearers being Donald Wilson, H. A Lambert, Edgar Gill & Ronald Skinner.

In 1858, John (1828-1915), George (1830-1919) & Aaron (1835-1907) Christopher formed a partnership: J. Christopher and Brothers steam planing and saw mill. In 1866, they organized the Oxford Land and Petroleum Company, which took oil leases around Oil Springs. In 1867, a company called Cook, Christopher & Company, lumber merchants was formed. Later they began the Ingersoll Rural Cemetery Company. By 1892, Aaron was a banker, broker and insurance agent, while John was a liquor and wine merchant.

The Ingersoll Sash & Door Factory was the first industry on the north side of the Thames River in Ingersoll. Located on Victoria Street in 1844, this was the first factory in Ingersoll to employ steam as a motive power. Later the factory moved to the southwest corner of Carroll and Charles Streets, commonly known as Harmony Hall, destroyed by fire and never rebuilt. The Christopher Brothers constructed many of the large homes in Ingersoll, as well as businesses, including a large block on Thames Street & St. James Anglican Church.

By 1894, Aaron Christopher was following in his father-in-law's footsteps, according to this advertisement in the 1894 Ingersoll Directory.

Ingersoll Chronicle, 1907 LAID AT REST--The remains of the late A. N. Christopher, were laid at rest in the Ingersoll Rural Cemetery on Saturday afternoon. The funeral, which was largely attended, took place from his late residence, Oxford Street, to St. James' Anglican Church, where an impressive service was conducted by the Rector Rev. R. J. M. Perkins, assisted by Rev. Canon Hincks. The town council attended in a body and many floral offerings indicated the high esteem in which deceased was held. The pallbearers were Messrs. Thomas Wells, Dr. Walker, Charles White, Walter Mills, and R. H. Young
